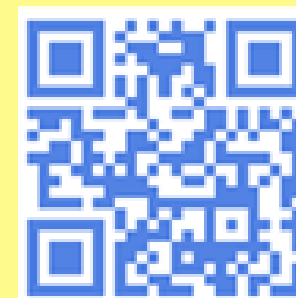
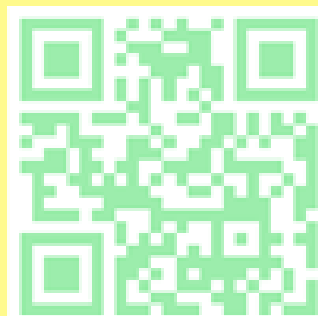


QR Codes

QR stands for Quick Response. It's basically a quick, scannable barcode-like image that takes you to a specific digital destination.

It is (usually) in the shape of a square. It looks like a bar code with splotches instead of lines.



How do you read a QR code?



To scan or read a QR code, you need:

- Mobil device (phone, iPad) with a camera
- QR Code Reader App
- Internet Access

What information will you see after you scan the QR code?



Once you scan it, the code will point your device to the data set up by the code creator.

QR codes can lead to many types of data (for example play a video, create a Facebook Like, scan to buy, etc), and you will always be prompted to tap to take the relevant action.

For example:

If the code encodes a web address (URL), it will redirect you to the website.

If the code encodes an email address, the QR reader will display the email address and allow you to copy it into your clipboard.

If the code encodes a text message, you will see the text message and with one click you can send it.

Downloading a QR Code Reader: Kaywa



1. Take out your mobil device (phone/iPad)
2. Download a free QR code reader onto your mobile device (phone or iPad).

We will use KaywaReader (Kaywa.com).

iPhone/iPad: Search for Kaywa. The results will list KaywaReader in the App store. Click to download KaywaReader (or you can go right to App store and type KaywaReader)

Android: Search for KaywaReader in Google Play or Google Play Store. Click to download.

NOTE: When prompted, there is no need to allow KaywaReader to access your location ("Don't Allow") and you can "Skip" the introductory slides

3. Lauch the KaywaReader, point your phone at the QR code and it will automatically detect the code

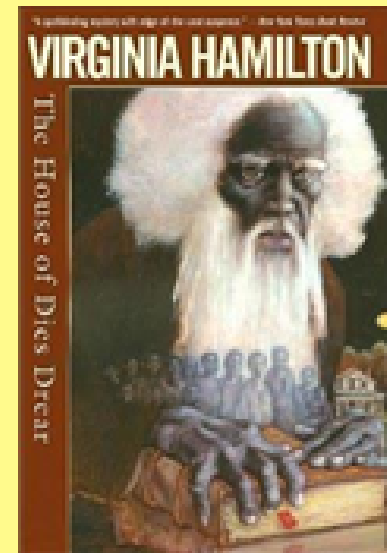


QR Code on the The House of Dies Drear by Virginia Hamilton poster

Two Ways to Add a QR Code to Your Google Drive



Option 1: Download the QR Code and save on your drive

Option 2: Copy the QR Code, paste it into a Google Doc and save the Google Doc

Option 1: To download the QR Code www.qrstuff.com and save on your drive

1. Pick Data Type (Website URL)

2. Type URL

3. Select a color for your QR Code

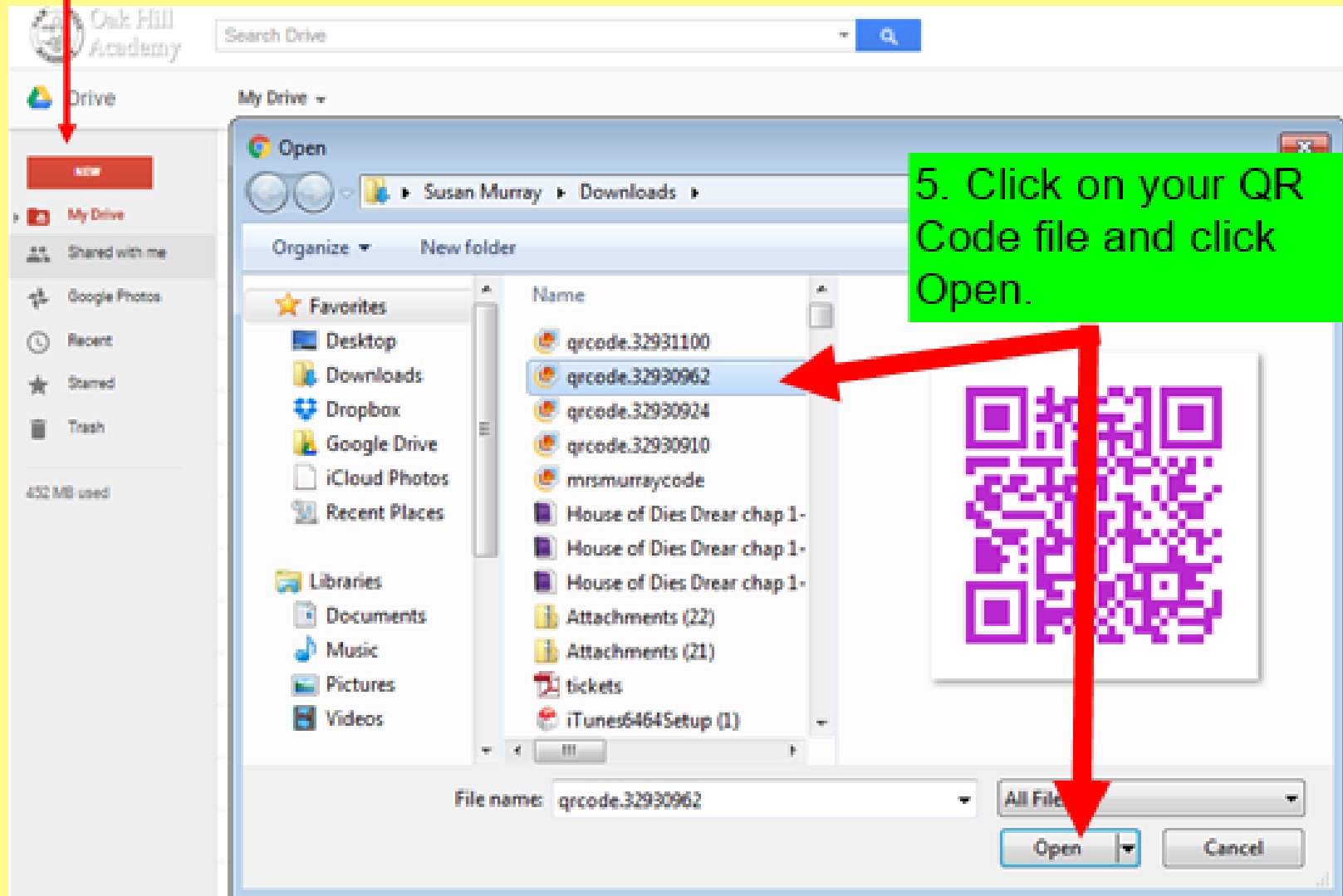
How to Save Your Downloaded QR Code into Your Google Drive



1. Open the Download folder on your computer and locate your QR Code file.
 2. Change the name of your QR Code file. Make the name something relevant to the information on your code (Underground Railroad Sites, Virginia Hamilton, etc.)
 - Right click on the file to change the file name

3. Open your Google Drive and click red NEW button on the left side of your screen.
 4. Select File Upload.
 5. Find your QR Code and click Open. It will now be on your Google Drive.
 6. Print the QR code file from here. Paste it on the front of your poster.

3. Open your Google Drive and click red NEW button

4. Select "File Upload"



5. Click on your QR Code file and click Open.

6. You can print the file directly from your Google Drive. Paste it on the bottom right corner of your poster.

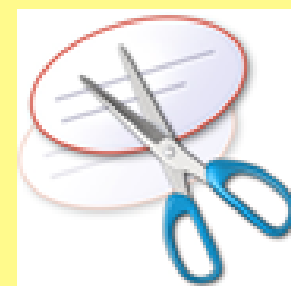
Option 2: ***See next slide for illustration***

Copy the QR Code onto your clipboard, create a new Google Doc, paste it into that Doc and Save it.

NOTE: The Snipping Tool is not available on all operating systems but it's a great tool if you have it!

Using the Snipping Tool

- Click on the Windows button
- Type Snipping Tool
- Use the Snipper to "snip" the QR Code.
- Copy that Snip into your clipboard.
- Paste the Snip into the Google Doc.

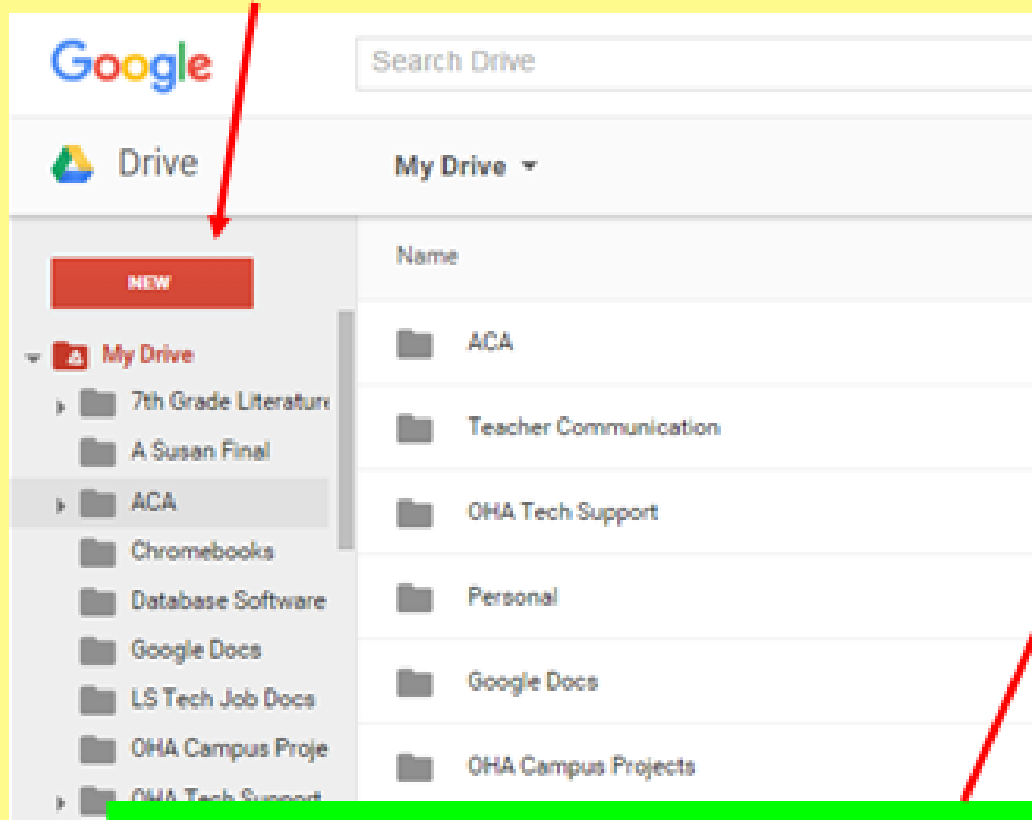
4. Launch Snipping Tool and snip QR Code Preview into clipboard

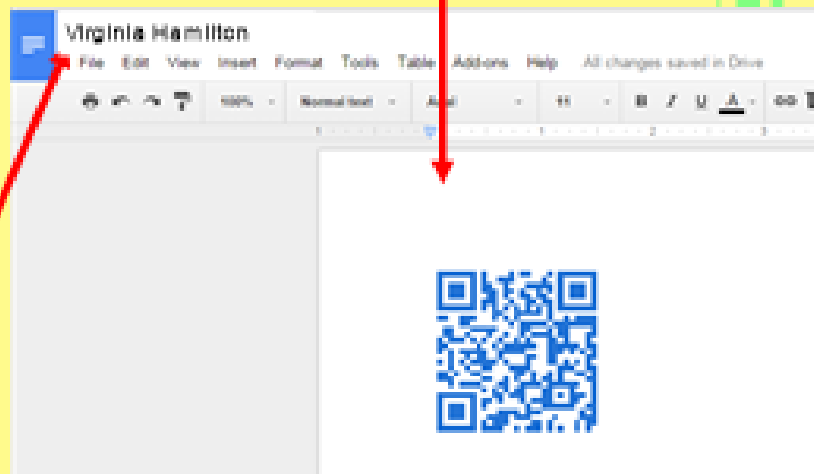

3. Open your Google Drive and click red NEW button



4. Select Google Docs

5. Paste your QR Code into the document.



6. Save file with new name (one that relates to the content of your QR Code) - Virigina Hamilton

7. You can print the file directly from your Google Drive. Paste it on the bottom right corner of your poster.
